For the month of April, our special hymn will be #365, "Oh, Be Careful." Here are the words to the hymn:

Scriptural Foundations: At the core of "Be Careful, Little Eyes" lies a foundation built upon the scriptures. The song draws from various biblical passages that emphasize the significance of guarding one's heart, mind, and actions. The lyrics encapsulate teachings found in Matthew 6:22-23, where Jesus admonishes believers to keep their eyes pure, for they are the lamp of the body.

Guidance on Conduct: The song not only underscores the importance of visual purity but extends its counsel to various aspects of behavior. It gently urges believers to be mindful of their ears, hands, and feet, referencing the scriptural idea that every part of our being should be aligned with righteousness. This resonates with biblical verses such as Proverbs 4:23, which emphasizes guarding the heart, the wellspring of life.

Childlike Simplicity: "Be Careful, Little Eyes" adopts a childlike simplicity in its language, making it accessible to all ages. This simplicity serves as a powerful vehicle for conveying profound truths, echoing Jesus' own encouragement for believers to approach the Kingdom of God with childlike faith (Matthew 18:3).

Call to Holiness: The song's repetitive structure, with each verse cautioning against various actions, serves as a rhythmic call to holiness. By reinforcing the importance of mindfulness in every aspect of life, the hymn aligns with the biblical call to be holy as God is holy (1 Peter 1:16).

Cultural Relevance: While firmly grounded in biblical teachings, "Be Careful, Little Eyes" transcends cultural and denominational boundaries. Its universal message of watchfulness and moral discernment speaks to the fundamental aspects of Christian living, making it a staple in worship settings around the world.

To match up with our hymn our memory for this month will be: Romans 12:2

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

May the Lord Jesus Christ bless us as we work with our children and neighbors to maintain the purity of our eyes, ears, tongues, hands, and feet during April, and beyond.
