Grace Greater than Sin

During the month of March our hymn is "Grace Greater than Our Sin" #522. And our memory verse Romans 15:4 "For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope."

The internet article www.hymncharts.com/2023/07/11/the-story-behind-grace-greater-than-our-sin has great history and commentary regarding this hymn. The article states that Grace Greater than Our Sin is a song that has inspired countless hearts with its message of human imperfection, God's infinite grace, and the power of faith. The hymn writer, Julia Harriette Johnston, finds inspiration from Romans 5:20,

Romans 5:18-21 ¹⁸Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men. ¹⁹For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. ²⁰Now the law came in to increase the trespass, but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, ²¹so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through righteousness leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

"Julia had a gift for writing. Her words found their way into Sunday School lessons for the David C. Cook Publishing Company, and she even authored several books during her lifetime. In closing, here are Paul's words from his letter to the Romans giving context to our memory verse reminding us of our source of Hope:

Romans 15:1-7 ¹We who are strong have an obligation to bear with the failings of the weak, and not to please ourselves. ²Let each of us please his neighbor for his good, to build him up. ³ For Christ did not please Himself, but as it is written, "The reproaches of those who reproached you fell on Me." ⁴For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, that through endurance and through the encouragement of the Scriptures we might have hope. ⁵May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to live in such harmony with one another, in accord with Christ Jesus, ⁶ that together you may with one voice glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. ⁷Therefore welcome one another as Christ has welcomed you, for the glory of God.
